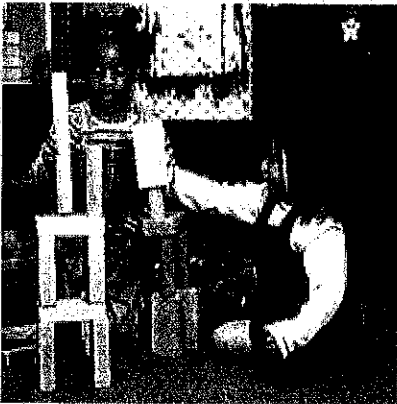

What is play?



Play is more than meets the eye. It is fundamental and essential for infants, toddlers, and preschool age children to develop healthy active brains, bodies, and relationships. Through play, children learn about themselves and the world through self-created experiences and positive social interactions with peers and nurturing adults. Children explore and practice complex motor, cognitive, communication, and social skills developing neural synapses that lead to self-regulation, symbolic or representational capacities, and executive functions. They develop competencies and character traits that support learning and emotional well-being. Given time, space, supportive adults, open-ended materials, and safe, yet challenging environments, children develop confidence in themselves, competencies to master their environment, deep-seated connectedness to and caring about others, the ability to create environments of love, safety, and security, and resilience.
